MERRY CHRISTMAS AND HAPPY NEW YEAR from the Council and Staff of the United Townships of Head, Clara & Maria. With the coming holidays, the <u>Municipal Office</u> will be closed the following dates.

Monday, January 2, 2017



Due to dates of Statutory Holidays this year, the Disposal Site, waste and recycling collection schedule will **NOT** be changed. Collection will occur at regular dates and times. To ensure recycling is picked up, please set your bags out before 9:00 a.m.

The <u>Garbage Collection</u> between **December 24nd and January 7th** will be <u>Amnesty</u> <u>Days</u> where more than the usual one bag of garbage will be collected roadside. For these dates, two **untagged** bags of normal household waste will be allowed. Rules as to unacceptable materials and sorting of recyclables will be enforced. We are simply allowing an additional bag or regular household waste due to the "normal" amount of extras accumulated over the holidays.

Come January, the Disposal Site Hours will be Reduced once again - for January, February and March **ONLY** the disposal site hours will be as follows. Bissett - Tuesdays - 12:30 - 2:00 p.m. and Stonecliffe - Thursdays - 12:45 - 2:30 p.m. Saturday hours remain the same.

A MESSAGE FROM MAYOR GIBSON

Greetings all,

I have some really good news for you and especially for our administrative staff. A few Council meetings ago, our admin staff brought a proposal to Council to do some renovations to the municipal office. These proposed renovations included moving walls and changing the office layout.

After discussion and debate Council indicated to staff that it was unwilling to allow the proposed renovations as it was basically a short term fix. Council then directed staff to come back with a design and proposal for a significant addition to the existing structure that would do the follow-ing:

- Satisfy the space needs for the next 15 to 20 years.
- Provide separate and private work spaces for the CAO and Treasurer.
- Increase staff safety and security.
- Add spare offices for use by auditors, building inspector, temporary staff, and summer students.
- Have private meeting space where ratepayers can do business with admin staff.
- Improve access to the library.
- Create a more modern and professional look to the admin building.

Staff did what they were asked and brought back a proposal that Council accepted so starting in the new year we will begin a two phase construction project that will see the existing office structure gutted and changed and an addition built when the frost is out of the ground. We hope to be back to normal business by midsummer. This work has been sole sourced to Mackey Construction who did the hall expansion and kitchen renovation to our satisfaction at a reasonable price.

The unfortunate thing about this is the disruption to normal business. Staff will be doing a lot of their work from home as they do now on Thursdays. Most of their work is done on computers now so it matters little where that computer is located.

I would ask that you bear with us for the next six months for this disruption to business and numerous office closures. Staff will keep you well informed of the logistical problems as they arise. This is short term pain for long term gain and I would ask that you call well in advance if you need to do business with our staff. Please watch our website and our Community bulletin boards for regular status updates on the construction progress and staff availability. I hope I'm not being presumptive by thanking you in advance for your patience and understanding. Now let's get to the really important part of this event and that is how is it going to be paid for and are our taxes going to go up? Yes, our taxes may go up by a very small amount. We intend to self finance this work using our healthy reserves and replenish those withdrawals over time to minimize any increase in taxes. We did that with the hall expansion and we'll do it here because it is cheapest and least painful way to look after our infrastructure needs over the long term.

Please, if you have any comments or concerns, direct them to any member of your Council.

I want to take this opportunity to thank our numerous volunteers for their collective thousands of hours of work they perform on an annual basis for the betterment of our Community. Without you, we would have nothing.

I wish all of you a very merry and peaceful Christmas and the very best in the New Year!

WHAT'S THE RISK?

Smoking and cooking are the **top 2 causes of fatal fires** during the holidays (Nov, Dec, Jan).

Injuries caused by smoking account for **1 in 10 home** fire injuries during the holidays.

Smoking accounts for **30%** of all home fire deaths during the holidays.

Cooking fires account for **19%** of all home fires during the holidays.

27% of all home fire injuries occur in cooking fires during the holidays.

Alcohol is a factor in many fatal fires involving smoking and cooking. DRINK RESPONSIBLY!

How do I protect my family during the holidays?

- Always stay in the kitchen while cooking. If you must leave, turn off the stove.
- Keep an eye on any drinkers in your household and make sure all cigarettes are properly extinguished and the stove is off before going to bed.
- Cigarettes can smoulder among upholstered items for hours before igniting. Check sofas and chairs for cigarettes that may have fallen between the cushions.
- Provide large, deep ashtrays for smokers.
- Wet cigarette butts with water before discarding.

ARE YOU PROTECTED BY SMOKE AND CO ALARMS?

 In 34% of fatal home fires there is no smoke alarm warning.



- Install smoke alarms on every storey of your home and outside all sleeping areas.
- CO alarms are required outside all sleeping areas if your home has a fuel-burning appliance, fireplace or attached garage.

WINTER DRIVING TIPS - STAY ALERT, SLOW DOWN, STAY IN CONTROL

(PEMBROKE, ON) – With winter weather in the forecast the Upper Ottawa Valley Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) would like to remind motorists that adverse weather conditions put extra demands on you as a driver and on your vehicle's performance.

STAY ALERT. SLOW DOWN. STAY IN CONTROL. These are three key elements to safe winter driving. Motorists are advised of the following safety tips to help everyone arrive at their destination safely.

- Drive according to current road and weather conditions. Reduce your speed when adverse weather conditions arise.
- Keep a safe distance between your vehicle and the vehicle in front of you. Remember, longer stopping distances may be required.
- Be able to see and be seen. Clean frost and snow off all windows, mirrors, and lights.
- Consider installing four winter tires on your vehicle, install good wiper blades and keep an ample supply of windshield washer fluid in your vehicle
- Give yourself extra time to reach your destination. Consider postponing or cancelling your trip if the weather does not improve.

The following is a list of some recommended items to carry in your vehicle:

- A charged cell phone in case of an emergency
- An ice scraper, snow brush, a small shovel, sand, salt or other traction aid
- Booster cables, road flares, fuel line anti-freeze, and tow rope
- Extra clothing and footwear, a blanket, high energy non-perishable food, matches and a candle
- Flashlight, small tool kit, first aid kit

To check on road conditions before your trip you can call 5-1-1. The Ministry of Transportation's Traveller Information Services provides road information for provincial highways in Ontario by telephone at 5-1-1 or online with accessible information on the MTO Ontario 511 website at www.ontario.ca/511

Bill would like to take this opportunity to wish you all a Merry Christmas.

Obviously, we don't like to tell people not to recycle however; its important to remember that at Christmas, with giftwrap, it's better to reuse or not use at all.

People often want to recycle as much as they can and stuff their bags with wrapping paper, tissue, ribbon, bows and more.

Unfortunately, glittery, shiny, laminated papers are not recyclable and often contaminate a whole load. Please consider your choice of wrappings, and if you use coloured papers—please use the garbage.

HCM Staff Diversion Efforts

We collect pop can tabs, stamps, Campbell's labels and milk bags at the municipal hall. We pass them on to different organizations or school groups who then collect larger amounts with the end goal of providing funds or a product to make someone's life easier. If you are aware of any other group or organization which collects recyclable materials for the greater good; let us know and we will investigate to see if it is something that we can support.

SNOW ON MUNICIPAL ROADS

Annual snowplow operations begin with the first significant snowfall of the year. This can be as early as November 15 (our contract start date) or as late as Mother Nature decides. Township bylaws and the *Highway Traffic Act* prohibit parking or stopping on a road in a way that interferes with plowing operations. Plow operators need clear roadways to complete their routes safely and on time. Under the *Highway Traffic Act*, residents are prohibited from depositing snow on any roadway. When clearing snow, pile it on your property – do not shovel it onto the road or across the road into the ditch. This practice is dangerous because it may cover the salt/sand applied and may cause drivers to lose control. It may also cause windrows of snow that freeze across the road



causing further hazards. Wilfred has already noticed and reported this practice in some areas. If it continues, the Ontario Provincial Police will be contacted for enforcement of the Ontario Highway Traffic Act, which also applies to municipal roads.

Be respectful of others and municipal operations; plow safely.



TRAILER PARKING FOR SLEDDERS

Municipal staff allow for parking of vehicles and trailers along municipal roads at certain locations along Mackey Creek and Ashport Roads. The snowplow turnarounds

are already plowed as widely as possible in these areas for this purpose; vehicles parking there are not ticketed provided they park where indicated.

So long as people park their vehicles along the left side of the road, the left side while traveling in the road (the south side of Mackey Creek Road and the north side of Ashport Road) they are OK. They will not be ticketed, towed or plowed in.

Be respectful of others and municipal operations. Ride Smart. Ride Safe.
